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Welcome to Forsa School

A collaborative effort between Sharjah Art Foundation and Naqd, Forsa School is an educational and professional programme designed to equip art practitioners and creative freelancers with practical skills needed to understand and navigate structural and institutional systems related to the UAE art industry. Running from 7 November 2020 to 13 February 2021, the initiative invites independent artists and designers residing in the UAE to participate in the programme, which will be composed of public seminars, private sessions and one-on-one mentoring led by a selection of key professionals from the art industry.

Registered participants will have access to a range of private sessions hosted by industry professionals that will cover and decode each key topic, providing participants with inside information and a safe space to discuss the challenges faced by the creative community. They will also have an opportunity to meet programme tutors for one-on-one mentoring sessions tailored to their individual needs. Public seminars will be streamed live and will be open to the general public.

FOR REGISTERED PARTICIPANTS

Studio Visits:

About the Tutors

Artist Talks

Artist Talks is an independent platform created and run by artist Sarah Almehairi that organises and presents talks with creatives based in and/or affiliated with the UAE. The talks are organised as a biannual series, with one session held during the fall and the other in the spring. Launched in April 2020, Artist Talks aims to provide a forum for initiating conversation, sharing practices and freely asking questions. Truly artist-focused, it seeks to connect creatives in an informal yet supportive learning environment. The platform also acts as an archive, housing recordings of the talks that can be easily accessed for future use.

Augustine Paredes

Artist and photographer Augustine Paredes' lyrical, contemporary and sensuous visual narratives are derived from his many-storied travels and Southeast Asian consciousness. Born on a Thursday, he is currently based in Dubai. Notable clients include Gucci, Les Benjamins, Puma, Adidas, Nike and Namshi, and his work has been featured in publications such as Vogue Arabia, Vogue Turkey, GQ Middle East, Elle Arabia, Elle Turkey, Der Greif, Canvas Magazine, Cosmopolitan Philippines, MEGA Man and Madame Magazine.

Azim Al Ghussein

In his creative practice, Azim Al Ghussein experiments with trying to extend various kinds of labour so that it can be shared. His practice is concerned with value and the ways in which it is measured and divided. Al Ghussein has worked as an illustrator and adjunct instructor in universities and is currently the Education and Outreach Coordinator at Tashkeel, Dubai. He studied visual communication, comics and printmaking and often refers to the modes of production in these fields to facilitate his practice.

Bait 15

BAIT15, an artist-run studio and exhibition space, was founded in late 2017 by Afra Al Dhaheri, Hashel Al Lamki and Maitha Abdalla. Zuhour Al Sayegh joined the collective in 2020. The members have interdisciplinary practices in painting, sculpture, textile and performance. BAIT 15 was conceived from a shared need for studio space and a mutual desire to establish an artist-run exhibition space. Independently managed and funded with an open and flexible mission, BAIT 15 can continuously adapt to the emerging art scene of the UAE. The collective is guided by the work created in the studios, the exhibitions that are held, and the artists, curators and communities with whom they engage.

Clay Corner Studio

Founded by Emirati visual artist and ceramicist Hessa Al Ajmani, Clay Corner Studio offers art facilities for both beginning and experienced artists, adults as well as children, who are looking for a supportive place to nurture their talents and learn new skills. Distinguished by its light and earthy aesthetic, the studio stimulates the creative flow and helps members to connect with clay as a natural material that combines the elements of earth, water, air and fire. The first of its kind in Ajman, the studio is fully equipped with all the necessary facilities for a ceramic and painting practice. It also offers hands-on workshops in ceramic hand-building, painting and drawing along with other multidisciplinary workshops, classes and critique sessions.

Daftar Asfar

Daftar Asfar is a collaborative publishing platform that focuses on creative collaboration and thoughtful artistic development. Founded in the Middle East, the project has received funding from the Warhol Foundation's Fulcrum Fund and presented work at Art Dubai's UAE NOW exhibition (2019). Most recently, the platform was awarded funding from the Arab Fund for Art and Culture (AFAC).

Danah Nassief

Danah Nassief is a designer and an educator who has taught multiple courses as a design lecturer at Dar Al Hekma University in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, in addition to conducting independent workshops and talks focusing on subjects that are often overlooked in formal design education. Along with her role as an educator, Nassief also worked as an Art Director at Blueprint Communications in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, before establishing her independent practice as a design consultant for small and medium businesses. After nine years in corporate and commercial graphic design, Nassief joined the faculty of the College of Arts and Creative Enterprises at Zayed University in Dubai, where, in addition to teaching, she advised students from different disciplines on their educational and career paths. She is currently pursuing a PhD in graphic design alongside her work in design consulting practice and workshops.

Jaffat El Aqlam

Jaffat El Aqlam, which established its digital existence through zines, open calls, workshops and collaborative dialogue, is an independent platform that celebrates artistic creations by humans from/based in the MENA region. Founded in 2014, Jaffat El Aqlam has grown to become an open space for artists/designers, writers, musicians, poets, start-ups and researchers to feature their work and contribute to the exploration of identities for those within and outside the MENA region.

Kathleen Hoare

Kathleen Hoare is a Dubai-based family, wedding and portrait photographer. Always after the candid moment rather than something too posed, Hoare strives to catch emotion in every image shot for her clients. She treats every job as a personal project and prides herself on knowing that her images are not only happy snaps but memories to be shared with friends and family. Although photography has always been an interest and a hobby, Hoare started to take it more seriously in 2013, when she took her first workshop at Gulf Photo Plus. Since then, she has spent as many hours as possible shooting, learning and teaching photography in order to master the craft. She has left her corporate job to pursue photography as a career, shooting for private clients as well as major international brands.

Kevin Jones

Kevin Jones is the founder of Juniper Mind. New York-born and Paris-bred, Jones has lived in the Middle East for the past fifteen years, serving as UAE Desk Editor for the magazine ArtAsiaPacific and contributing art criticism both regionally and internationally to other publications such as The Art Newspaper, Artforum, ArtReview and Flash Art International. He was an instructor in Art Jameel's Hayy:Learning initiative for emerging Saudi artists and Ithra's Emerging Artists Open Call and has been a faculty member and mentor at Dubai-based non-profit Tashkeel since 2015. Formerly a strategist with international branding and communications agencies, including Havas Worldwide, Jones has positioned Juniper Mind to help artists, brands and institutions think more critically.

Lujain Abulfaraj

(Twothirds Design Studio)

Lujain Abulfaraj is the co-founder and creative director of Twothirds Design Studio, founder of Akwan, and co-founder and previous design director at WTD Magazine. She is a graduate of Visual Communications from the American University of Sharjah, where she began her exploration of Arabic typography and calligraphy. Abulfaraj kick-started her career by doing the branding for Makkah Newspaper, based in Saudi Arabia, as well as the UAE Pavilion in its first participation in the Venice Architecture Biennale. With 10 years' experience in the design field, Abulfaraj continues to find inspiration in cultural aesthetics coupled with Arabic typography and their transformation into experimental designs.

Maha Bin Hendi Law Firm

Moza Almatrooshi is a Sharjah-based conceptual artist who recently obtained an MFA from Slade School of Fine Art in London. Almatrooshi's practice is currently positioned within the study of erased mythology from the Arabian Peninsula, which she correlates with present modes of seeing. Within this lens, the exploration of those themes materialises in performances, moving image, audio media and text-based work. Recent work has culminated in a performance in the Victoria and Albert Museum, London; a residency in Townhouse Gallery, Cairo; and moving image productions shown at the Institute of Contemporary Arts (ICA), London, and during Lahore Biennale 2020.

Munira Al Sayegh

Munira Al Sayegh is an independent curator who has curated exhibitions such as The Cup and the Saucer, Warehouse421, Abu Dhabi (2020); Gulf Now, Art Dubai (2020, 2019); The Creative Act: Performance, Process, Presence, Guggenheim Abu Dhabi (2017); and Bayn, Abu Dhabi Art (2017). Al Sayegh has participated in panels examining the importance of non-institutional thinking and rhetoric in refining what local and regional art looks like from the bottom up. She has also published various articles on the region's contemporary art scene.

Nadine Khalil

Nadine Khalil has held leading editorial positions for the past decade at magazines in Beirut (Bespoke, Executive | Life, A Mag) and Dubai (Canvas), covering arts and culture. She has authored a series of artist monographs, including works on Lebanese artists Samir Sayegh and Hanibal Srouji and the late filmmaker Jocelyne Saab. Her writing can also be found in Art Monthly, Ocula, Financial Times, Goethe's Art, Thought, Women's Review of Books, Selections and Harper's Bazaar Art. Before she began writing for publications, Khalil worked as an independent curator with the non-profit art organisations Ashkal Alwan and the Arab Image Foundation and with video art festivals in Europe such as MidEast Cut and the Arab Independent Film Festival. She has an academic background in anthropology.

Saira Ansari

Saira Ansari is a researcher and writer with an interest in South Asian art history, global modernity, alternative narratives and science fiction. Ansari has served as a Contributing Editor (Art) for the South Asian literary journal Papercuts, Managing Editor for monographs on Abbas Akhavan (SKIRA / Works on Paper, 2018) and Poursan Jinchi (Akkadia Press / Works on Paper, 2019), and Arts Correspondent at The Rio Times (2010). Her writing has been published in various art publications, including Art in the Age of Anxiety (Sharjah Art Foundation and Mörel Books, 2020). Ansari was previously Director of Communications at The Third Line, Dubai, and now works in Publishing and Research at Sharjah Art Foundation.

Sheikh Salem bin Faisal Al Qassimi

Salem Al Qassimi is the Founder and Principal of Fikra, a design-led educational platform that comprises Fikra Design Studio (est. 2006), Fikra Campus (est. 2017) and the Fikra Graphic Design Biennial (est. 2018). A multidisciplinary graphic designer, educator and entrepreneur, Al Qassimi has been teaching design for over a decade—as an instructor at the Rhode Island School of Design, Assistant Professor of Design at the American University of Sharjah, and more recently, as Adjunct Assistant Professor of Design and Photography at New York University Abu Dhabi. His research addresses notions of contemporary cultural identity in the UAE and the region through the lens of design. He has won several international awards, including the Type Directors Club (TDC) and protoType at Typecon2016, and he has participated in a number of exhibitions both in the UAE and abroad. He has edited several books and actively publishes articles, reviews and essays on Arabic typography, culture, design and design education.

Samt

A platform co-founded by Walid Al Wawi, Samt is one of the first virtual gallery spaces to deal strictly with the political Middle East through anonymous contributions and provide a mentorship programme for artists. Born in 1988, Al Wawi is concerned with the contemporary hybridisation of Middle Eastern identity and the implications of its geopolitical claustrophobia for cultural naturalisation.

Sofiane Si Merabet

Travel-obsessed and polyglot, artist and cultural entrepreneur Sofiane Si Merabet has always been involved in projects reflecting on plural identities. From the digital platform TheConfusedArab (www.theconfusedarab.com), Si Merabet explores the 'future of nostalgia' concept. In parallel with his on-going questioning around themes such as memories, identities and diaspora, he has started to explore these themes through interactive installations. In the majority of his installations, Si Merabet interrogates emblematic spaces and their roles in human interactions.

Stefan Messam

Stefan KK Messam has been drawing for as long as he can remember. His work explores conventions of identity and the range of codes and symbols people construct to remind themselves of identity, experiences, memories, day-to-day routines, passions and secrets. Expanded to construct a compelling visual narrative, his work presents a playful look at these concepts with cryptic sets of symbols and codes that are never really meant to be read, only acknowledged as representative of a depth of identity and personality. He is Associate Professor in Foundations and Design at the College of Arts and Creative Enterprises, Zayed University, Dubai. He earned a master's degree in design, majoring in illustration and visual narrative.

Stephanie Mahmoud

Stephanie Mahmoud has spent over a decade working in marketing, project management and brand strategy. Her interests include art in all its forms, gardening and the intersection of food and culture. A deeply organised (but also deeply messy) person at heart, she learned (through much trial and error) how to use her professional skills in project management and apply them to... everything in life. She is excited to share that knowledge—as well as all of the mistakes she has made along the way—to help other creatives manage their time and resources effectively.

Toleen Badawi

As a coach for individuals, executives and other groups, Toleen Badawi is constantly exploring and working to understand how to make people fulfilled and more successful in their lives, both professionally and personally. She helps her clients develop a personal vision and manage change during personal and professional transitions, and she offers guidance towards personal and professional growth that will lead to fulfillment and happiness. Her training approach is influenced by a coaching model that increases the retention of material, engagement and success of the trainees. When working directly with organisations, Badawi focuses on training individuals, teams and different organisational levels, from mid-management to executive, to guide trainees in developing the proper internal mental process to ensure that targets and objectives are achieved while employee engagement and a healthy organisational environment and culture are maintained.

Yasmin Atassi

Yasmin Atassi is the Director of Green Art Gallery in Dubai, which she co-founded in 1995 with her late mother, Mayla Atassi. Since its inception, Green Art Gallery has played an important role in introducing modern Arab art to Dubai and helping to establish a vital dialogue among some of the most important modern Arab masters, including Fateh Moudaress, Louay Kayyali, Ismail Fattah, Dia Azzawi and others. Taking over the Gallery in 2010, Atassi went on to rebrand and build up the Gallery's curatorial program and artist roster. Representing a multi-generational mix of artists from the Middle East, North Africa, South Asia, Turkey and beyond, the Gallery has focused on contemporary artists working across different media, both traditional and new, whose practices reflect our current time and draw on research-based ideas.

This studio visit will explore Fikra Campus and the Fikra Design Studio. Participants will engage in an intimate conversation with founder Salem Al Qassimi about supporting the design community and the challenges of launching a space.

Navigating Galleries **Yasmin Atassi**

This session will explore how to navigate relationships with galleries, from representation to expectations, and how to edit and curate what would be shown in a gallery. The session will also look at alternative ways of showcasing work (not relying solely on one kind of representation) and how these ways can strengthen and cement a career in the arts.

Writing as Practice **Saira Ansari**

This session will develop participants' skill sets in writing, focusing on creative non-fiction as opposed to industrial and commercialised styles of writing. The session will cover writing for periodicals, reviews, catalogues and essays while also exploring how writing can be a playful and liberating activity.

Social Media and Collaborative Strategies
Sofiane Se Merabat

This session will consider the challenges of having a social media presence that may be over- or under-exposing one's practice. It will also debunk negative myths around commercialism and collaboration with luxury brands, presenting these instead as opportunities to support an art career so long as creative practitioners are able to remain anchored in their own identity.

Maintaining a Studio Practice
Azim Al Ghussein

In this session, participants will explore the ways in which they can pursue a studio practice within the parameters of contemporary living in the UAE. The topics to be discussed include workspace set-up, scheduling and planning, finances and sustainability within creative practices. The content of the session should be relevant to both designers and artists living and working in the UAE.

Business Basics for UAE Photographers
Kathleen Hoare

This session will explore how freelance photographers can set up their own business in the UAE. From obtaining licenses and shooting permissions and pricing work to dealing with locally based gear sellers, marketing and creating service lists, this session will arm participants with a pathway to launch.

Setting Up a Studio for Artists by an Artist
Clay Corner Studio

This studio visit will explore Clay Corner Studio, which was founded to address the needs of a wide spectrum of practitioners, from beginners to practising artists. The studio's multifaceted business model both subsidises the co-founder's personal practice and supports the community at large. This session will reflect on the challenges of and opportunities in launching a studio.

Dealing with Artist Blocks
Stefan Messam

This session will explore how to overcome creative blocks, moments of staleness and roadblocks in an art practice. Through prompts and drawing exercises, the session aims to disrupt, pivot and evolve participants' practice and streams of thought around their work.

Improving Your Relationship with Failure
Toleen Badawi

This session will explore the mental blocks hindering the development of an art career. Combining methods from executive coaching and cognitive healing, this session will help participants better understand their fears and doubts and navigate issues related to self-worth and imposter syndrome so they can overcome any mental blocks through a structured career strategy.

Critique and Writing**Nadine Khalil, Rania Jishi**

This session will look at different modes of engagement that creative practitioners can use with the publishing industry and consider the need for more peer-to-peer critique. Debunking the cultural and emotional challenges around critique and feedback, the session will arm participants with ways in which the publishing industry, journalism and conversations around their work can be made less intimidating and more engaging.

The Influential Educator**Rania Jishi**

This session will cover the basics of lesson planning, looking to education as a way to bridge gaps between audiences and institutions. It will also explore contextualised and fluid methods of teaching to produce programmes that are relevant to both hosting institutions and audiences.

The PR Dialogue**Maryam Al Dabbagh and Yusur Al Dabbagh**

In this session, participants will learn how to write about their work and practice for the press and how to utilise public relations tactics and communication tools to increase awareness and public engagement. The session will cover creating a press kit, furthering intercultural communications, creating bilingual strategies and building relationships with the press.

Setting Up a Studio**Bait15**

In this session, participants will learn about the journey of a self-funded artist-run studio nestled in a residential neighbourhood in Abu Dhabi. The collective will share their experiences around setting up the studio, managing it, engaging with the community, establishing the necessary discipline and setting boundaries while also motivating and inspiring each another.
